ACC NOTES

BOWL SEASON TO FEATURE NINE ACC TEAMS

■ Led by league champion Clemson's seventh appearance in the Capital One Orange Bowl, the ACC placed nine teams in football postseason games. This is the 22nd consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least nine teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 100 postseason appearances.

■ Clemson (11-2), which earned a No. 7 CFP national ranking following its 39-10 win over North Carolina in the Subway ACC Football Championship Game, will face No. 6 Tennessee (10-2) on Friday, Dec. 30, at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens, Florida (8 p.m., ESPN).

■ Clemson will be making a bowl appearance for the 18th consecutive year, adding to its current school record that began in 2005. It is the current longest active streak among ACC teams and the fifth-longest in the nation. In total, it will be Clemson's 49th bowl appearance, with the Tigers holding a 26-22 record in bowl play.

■ The Wasabi Fenway Bowl will kick off ACC Bowl Season with a matchup of Louisville (7-5) vs. Cincinnati (9-3) on Dec. 17 at 11 a.m. on ESPN. It will be the 19th different bowl game for Louisville. The Fenway Bowl will be the 11th game that the Cardinals have played in a Major League Baseball stadium. The teams will play for the Keg of Nails, a traveling trophy awarded to the winner of the Louisville-Cincinnati game since 1929. The exchange between the universities of two cities connected by Interstate 71, is believed to have been initiated by the universities' fraternity chapters, signifying that the winning players in the game were "tough as nails."

■ Wake Forest will make its first appearance in the Gasparilla Bowl when it takes on Missouri (6-6) on Dec. 23 at 6:30 p.m. on ESPN. Overall, this will mark Wake Forest's fifth bowl experience in Florida and its second-straight as the Deacs defeated Rutgers in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl a season ago. The Deacons will face Missouri for the first time as it makes its school-record seventh consecutive bowl appearance under head coach Dave Clawson and its 17th overall postseason trip.

■ Duke, under ACC Coach of the Year Mike Elko, is headed to the Military Bowl Presented by Peraton where it will face UCF on Dec. 28 at 2 p.m. on ESPN. The Blue Devils have wins in each of their last three postseason contests. Elko has participated in eight previous bowl games as a defensive coordinator, helping Bowling Green (0-3), Wake Forest (1-0), Notre Dame (1-0) and Texas A&M (3-0) to a combined 5-3 record. The Blue Devils will face UCF for the first time.

■ ACC Coastal Division Champion North Carolina (9-4) will be making its 37th bowl appearance when it takes on Oregon (9-3) on Dec. 28 at 8 p.m. on FOX. This will be the 26th bowl game for head coach Mack Brown, who owns a 15-10 record in postseason games. The Tar Heels will appear in a bowl game for the fourth year in a row but in the Holiday Bowl for the first time. Oregon is currently ranked 15th in the College Football Playoff poll, 14th in the Coaches Poll and 15th in the AP Poll. This will be the first game between the Tar Heels and the Ducks.



■ The Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium features Syracuse (7-5) vs. Minnesota (8-4) on Dec. 29 at 2 p.m. This will be Syracuse's 27th all-time bowl game. The program's .635 postseason winning percentage (16-9-1) is the sixth-best in the FBS among teams with 15-or-more bowl games played. This year's Pinstripe Bowl will be a rematch of the 2013 Texas Bowl, where the Orange came away with a 21-17 win. The Orange are 2-3 versus Minnesota all time.

■ Florida State (9-3) will make its 49th overall bowl trip when it faces Oklahoma (6-6) on Dec. 29 in the Cheez-It Bowl at 5:30 p.m. on ESPN. The Seminoles are 3-0 in the Cheez-It Bowl, tied for the most wins in bowl history. The Cheez-It Bowl will be the fifth postseason matchup between Florida State and Oklahoma, with FSU winning the Gator Bowl on Jan. 2, 1965, and Oklahoma earning wins in the Orange Bowl following the 1979, 1980 and 2000 seasons. FSU is 6-4 in bowl games against current Big 12 teams.

■ NC State (8-4) faces Maryland (7-5) on Dec. 30 in the Duke's Mayo Bowl in Charlotte at noon on ESPN. The overall series record between NC State and Maryland stands exactly even at 33-33-4. The Wolfpack and the Terps met every year on the gridiron from 1956 until Maryland's departure from the ACC following the 2013 season. This is NC State's 34th bowl appearance (17-15-1) and will mark the fourth time the Wolfpack has played a bowl game in Bank of America Stadium. The Wolfpack won the 2005 Meineke Car Care Bowl and the 2011 Belk Bowl and lost the 2015 Belk Bowl.

■ Pitt (8-4), which won four straight games to close the regular season, heads to El Paso, Texas, for the Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl and will face No. 18 UCLA (9-3) at 2 p.m. on CBS. Pitt is 2-2 in four prior trips to the Sun Bowl. In previous games in El Paso, the Panthers defeated Kansas (33-19 in 1975) and Texas A&M (31-28 in 1989) before falling to Oregon State (3-0 in 2008) and Stanford (14-13 in 2018) in the second-oldest bowl game in all of college football, behind only the Rose Bowl. This year will mark the 15th all-time meeting between Pitt and UCLA, but the first since 1972.

ACC NOTES

■ The ACC, which plays arguably the most difficult non-conference schedule in the country every season, had the second-most non-conference wins of any conference through the end of the regular season.

■ The ACC has nine bowl eligible teams, which ties for second among all conferences.

■ The ACC Atlantic Division has six teams with a winning record, which is more than any other division in the country.

■ The ACC has 43 wins against teams with a .500 record-or-better, which ranks second among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has the best non-conference opponents record (by win total) of any Power 5 conference.

■ ACC defenses have played well this year ranking:

- First in sacks
- First in tackles for loss
- First in turnovers gained
- First in turnover margin
- Second in total defense

■ Twenty-three of the ACC's 56 conference games this season were decided by 7 points or fewer.

THREE ACC TEAMS IN CFP TOP 25 RANKINGS

■ Three ACC teams are ranked in the final CFP Top 25 rankings, released, Dec. 4 - No. 7 Clemson, No. 13 Florida State and No. 23 NC State.

■ Three ACC teams are ranked in the AP Top 25 poll (Dec. 4) - No. 10 Clemson, No. 13 Florida State and No. 25 NC State. North Carolina and Pitt are also receiving votes.

■ In the USA TODAY AFCA coaches poll, Clemson is No. 11, followed by No. 13 Florida State and No. 25 North Carolina. NC State, Pitt and Duke are receiving votes.

ALBERTO RIVERON NAMED ACC SUPERVISOR OF FOOTBALL OFFICIALS

■ Alberto Riveron has been named the ACC's new Supervisor of Football Officials. Riveron, who served as the NFL's Senior Vice President of Officiating from 2017-20 and currently works as an NFL Rules analyst, has compiled a distinguished 30-year career as both an on-field official and an officiating administrator in the NCAA and NFL.

■ Among his duties, Riveron will be responsible for managing the oversight, supervision, leadership, training and development of an ACC officiating staff that includes on-field officials, instant replay officials, instant replay communicators, position coaches, evaluators and assistant supervisors. He will also serve as the day-to-day administrator of the ACC's Football Officiating Alliance and will develop conference football officiating schedules and assignments.

THREE ACC PLAYERS EARN NATIONAL AWARDS

■ Florida State's Dillan Gibbons is the 2022 Wuerffel Trophy recipient for outstanding community service combined with athletic and academic achievement. Gibbons is the first ACC player to win the award, which was created in 2005. Gibbons was also named captain of the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team.

■ North Carolina wide receiver Tylee Craft was named the recipient of the 2022 Disney Spirit Award just eight months after nearly losing his life to lung cancer. The Disney Spirit Award goes to the most inspirational figure in college football.

■ NC State's Christopher Dunn won the 2022 Lou Groza Award as the nation's top place-kicker. Dunn is the third ACC player in the last five years to win the honor. He is the second Wolfpack kicker to earn the honor, joining Marc Primanti (1996). In 2022, Dunn converted 24 of 25 field goal attempts and all 30 extra point tries.

KANCEY, DUNN EARN CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICA HONORS

■ Pitt defensive tackle Calijah Kancey has been named a unanimous All-America, and NC State place-kicker Christopher Dunn has earned consensus All-America honors. The NCAA uses five All-America teams to determine consensus and unanimous status: Associated Press, AFCA, Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), Sporting News and the Walter Camp Football Foundation. Kancey was named first team on all five teams and Dunn was first team on four of the five.

■ The ACC placed 11 players - representing six different schools - on NCAA recognized 2022 All-America teams. Pitt led the league with three selections - Kancey, RB Israel Abanikanda and DB Erick Hallett II. Clemson, North Carolina and NC State had two players each on at least on All-America team, followed by Boston College and Miami with one apiece.

ACC RECORD SETTERS

■ NC State place-kicker Christopher Dunn became the ACC career record-holder with 93 field goals this season. He passed Florida State's Dustin Hopkins who had 88 from 2009-12. Dunn has also converted 200 of 200 career extra point attempts. He is the only player in ACC history to make 100 percent of his extra points with at least 200 attempts. Roberto Aguayo, Florida State, 2013-15 (made 198 of 198) and Nick Sciba, Wake Forest, 2018-21 (made 193 of 193) are the only other players in league history with 100 percent made and at least 190 attempts.

■ Dunn also has the ACC career record for points (479), surpassing Clemson running back Travis Etienne's previous mark of 468 points.

■ Clemson place-kicker B.T. Potter holds the ACC career record with 230 extra points made. Earlier this year, he moved past Clemson kicker Greg Huegel who made 218 from 2015-18.

RECORD CHASE - SAM HARTMAN, WF

■ Wake Forest QB Sam Hartman is tied with former Clemson quarterback Tajh Boyd (2010-13) for the ACC career record for touchdown passes with 107. Hartman and Boyd are the only two ACC players with more than 100 career touchdown passes.

■ Hartman is one of just six players in the country with 30-or-more touchdown passes this season, and he has played the fewest number of games. Hartman is averaging more than three TD passes per game.

■ Hartman has accounted for at least one touchdown in 33-straight games, which is the longest active streak in the nation.

■ Hartman is Wake Forest's all-time passing leader and has now thrown for 12,687 career passing yards, which ranks second in ACC history.

■ North Carolina freshman QB Drake Maye has 35 TD passes this season, which ranks tied for eighth on the ACC single-season chart. The ACC single-season record of 42 was set in 2021 by Pitt's Kenny Pickett.

■ Maye's 35 TDs are the third most in ACC history by an ACC freshman quarterback. Florida State's Jameis Winston holds the ACC single-season freshman record with 40 in 2013 and North Carolina's Sam Howell had 38 in his freshman season in 2019.

AROUND THE ACC

▼ **Boston College:** First-team All-ACC WR Zay Flowers broke every major receiving record at BC in his senior season; pushing to the top of the chart in receptions (200), receiving yards (3,056) and receiving touchdowns (29).

▼ **Clemson:** Clemson won 10 games for a school-record 12th consecutive season. Clemson became only the third FBS program ever to post 11 consecutive 10-win seasons alongside Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (14 from 2008-21).

▼ **Duke:** QB Riley Leonard is the first player in program history to record 10-plus rushing and 20-plus passing touchdowns in a single season. Leonard leads all ACC quarterbacks in rushing yards.

▼ **Florida State:** Florida State is one of three teams, along with No. 1 Georgia and No. 6 Alabama, ranked in the top-15 nationally in both yards per play on offense and defense.

▼ **Georgia Tech:** LB Ayinde Eley finished the season with 118 tackles, which are the most by a Yellow Jacket since P.J. Davis in 2014 (119 in 14 games). Eley is one of only three Yellow Jackets since 2000 with as many as 118 tackles in a season (Julian Burnett - 120 in 2011 and Davis).

▼ **Louisville:** DE Yasir Abdullah was a dominating force on a defense that finished second nationally in the ACC in sacks. He was second in the league with 8.0 sacks and seventh in the conference with 13.0 tackles for loss.

▼ **Miami:** First-team All-ACC safety Kam Kinchens tied for the nation's lead in interceptions during the regular season and paced the Hurricanes with 59 tackles. His six picks trail only Bennie Blades (10) and Sean Taylor on Miami's single-season interception list.

▼ **North Carolina:** North Carolina has six road wins in a season for the first time ever. The Tar Heels were 6-0 in league play for the first time going 8-0 in 2015.

▼ **NC State:** LB Drake Thomas leads the Wolfpack with 90 tackles and ranks first among all ACC defensive players with 13 tackles for loss in conference games. Thomas also ranks second in the ACC with 6.5 sacks in ACC contests.

▼ **Pitt:** ACC DPOY Calijah Kancey is the only student-athlete in the country who was named a finalist for both the 2022 Outland Trophy (top interior lineman) and the Bronko Nagurski Trophy (top defensive player). He has compiled 31 tackles, 14.5 tackles for loss and 7.5 sacks in 11 games played.

▼ **Syracuse:** First-team All-ACC TE Orande Gadsden set single-season program records for receptions (54) and receiving yards (891) this season. He leads the nation in receiving yards and touchdowns by a tight end, and is sixth in the ACC in receiving yards by any player regardless of position.

▼ **Virginia:** Brennan Armstrong broke the ACC's record for passing yards by a left-handed quarterback against Pitt. Armstrong's 9,034 career passing yards are the 12th most by a left-handed QB in FBS history.

▼ **Virginia Tech:** Running back Jalen Holston had a career-high 26 carries in the win over Liberty and racked up a career-best three touchdowns and career-high 99 rushing yards. It marked his first multi-touchdown performance since Nov. 14, 2020 versus then-No. 9 Miami (Fla.) in Blacksburg.

▼ **Wake Forest:** First-team WR A.T. Perry has totaled 70 catches for 980 yards and 11 touchdowns this season. He has recorded 28 career touchdown receptions, the most by a WF wideout in program history.

AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM

■ Three ACC student-athletes – the most of any conference – were selected to the 2022 Allstate American Football Coach Association (AFCA) Good Works Team. Duke's DeWayne Carter, Florida State's Dillan Gibbons and Pitt's Deslin Alexandre. Gibbons was voted captain of the team.

ACC COACHING NOTES

■ Four new football coaches joined the ACC for the 2022 season: Duke's Mike Elko, Miami's Mario Cristobal, Virginia's Tony Elliott and Virginia Tech's Brent Pry. Georgia Tech's Brent Key, who took over on an interim basis in the middle of the 2022 season, was named the Yellow Jackets' permanent head coach on Nov. 29.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Scott Satterfield (Louisville) rank among the top 30 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .809 winning percentage ranks second in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 274 victories.

■ Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney secured his 150th career win in the Cheez-It Bowl vs. Iowa State in 2021. Swinney joins Bobby Bowden as the only head coaches ever to lead an ACC program to 150 wins. It was Swinney's 11th bowl victory, which ties Bowden's record (11) for the most career bowl wins leading an ACC program. Swinney has 160 ACC wins, which is 12 shy of Bobby Bowden's record.

■ Two of the five active coaches to win a national title reside in the ACC. Dabo Swinney led Clemson to national titles in 2016 and 2018. North Carolina's Mack Brown won a national title at Texas in 2005.

■ Five current league coaches have won ACC Coach of the Year honors - North Carolina's Mack Brown in 1996, Clemson's Dabo Swinney in 2015 & 2018, Louisville's Scott Satterfield in 2019, Wake Forest's Dave Clawson in 2021 and Duke's Mike Elko in 2022.

GEORGIA TECH, LOUISVILLE HIRE NEW HEAD COACHES

■ Brent Key, a Georgia Tech alumnus and football letterwinner, was officially named the 21st head coach in Tech football history on Nov. 29, 2022. Key takes the reins of the program after leading the Yellow Jackets to a 4-4 record over the final eight games of the 2022 season as interim head coach.

■ Jeff Brohm, one of the most accomplished signal-callers in school history, was named Louisville's head coach on Dec. 8, 2022. The 24th head coach in school history, Brohm's No. 11 jersey is one of 26 to be honored by the program throughout its history. In nine seasons as a head coach, Brohm boasts a career record of 66-44, a .600 winning percentage, and has positioned himself as one of the top offensive minds in the country.

HOME OF THE ACC

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

■ The ACC is off to another great start to the championship season in 2022-23. NC State won the women's cross country national championship on Nov. 19, North Carolina won the field hockey national title on Nov. 30 and Syracuse won the men's soccer national championship on Dec. 12.

■ No other conference won more NCAA national championships in 2021-22 than the ACC. The league's seven titles matched the conference's record in an academic year, which was set in 2009-10. The ACC brought home NCAA Championships in women's cross country (NC State), women's soccer (Florida State), men's soccer (Clemson), women's swimming & diving (Virginia), fencing (Notre Dame), men's tennis (Virginia) and women's lacrosse (North Carolina). Additionally, ACC student-athletes won 24 individual national titles in 2021-22.

■ The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.

■ The ACC has won three of the last nine football national titles and three of the last seven men's basketball national championships (most of any conference).

■ Clemson (15-0) won the league's eighth football national championship in 2018 with a 44-16 win over previously unbeaten Alabama. The 28-point margin of victory was the largest over a No. 1 ranked team in ACC history.

ACC SUCCESS IN 2021-22

■ Eleven ACC programs finished the 2021-22 season ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 in their respective sports, and 12 of 15 member schools captured either an ACC or NCAA Championship.

■ Six ACC schools placed among the top 25 of the final Division I LEARNFIELD College Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina finished sixth and was joined in the top 10 by Notre Dame, which placed eighth. Virginia (11th), Florida State (14th), NC State (17th) and Duke (21st) completed the ACC's top-25 contingent. Virginia Tech (33rd place), Louisville (34th), Wake Forest (45th) and Miami (50th) followed to give the ACC 10 institutions among the top 50. This marks the 20th consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final rankings.

■ The ACC had the most Honda Award winners of any conference in 2021-22 with four – Florida State's Jaelin Howell (soccer), Virginia's Kate Douglass (swimming), North Carolina's Jamie Ortega (lacrosse) and Louisville's Lauren Thibodeau (Inspiration Award).

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

■ The ACC has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in eight of the last nine years, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

■ The ACC placed 10 teams in football postseason bowl games in 2021. It is the 21st consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least 10 teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 91 postseason appearances.

■ Four ACC teams finished the 2021 season ranked in the AP Top 25. In the AP poll, ACC Champion Pitt finished No. 13, its highest ranking since 1982. The Panthers were followed by No. 14 Clemson, No. 15 Wake Forest and No. 20 NC State.

■ Led by unanimous first-team All-America defensive tackle Calijah Kancey of Pitt, the ACC placed 11 players – representing six different schools – on NCAA recognized 2022 All-America teams. Pitt led the league with three selections. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, AFCA and Walter Camp to determine consensus All-Americans.

■ Pitt quarterback Kenny Pickett finished third in the voting for the 2021 Heisman Trophy. He is the seventh ACC player in the last nine years to finish in the top three, including 2013 winner Jameis Winston of FSU and 2016 winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence finished second in 2020. North Carolina QB Drake Maye finished 10th in the 2022 balloting.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State) and Dave Doeren (NC State) rank among the top 30 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's winning percentage ranks first in the nation among coaches with 10 years of experience and Brown is second among all active coaches in wins.

■ The ACC announced a new football scheduling model that will go into effect beginning with the 2023 season. The new model is based on a 3-5-5 structure whereby each team will play three primary opponents annually and face the other 10 league teams twice during the four-year cycle, once at home and once on the road. The schedule allows for each team to face all 13 conference opponents home and away at least once during the four-year cycle.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME & BOWL SUCCESS

■ In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation announced a 10-year agreement that will keep the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game will be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.

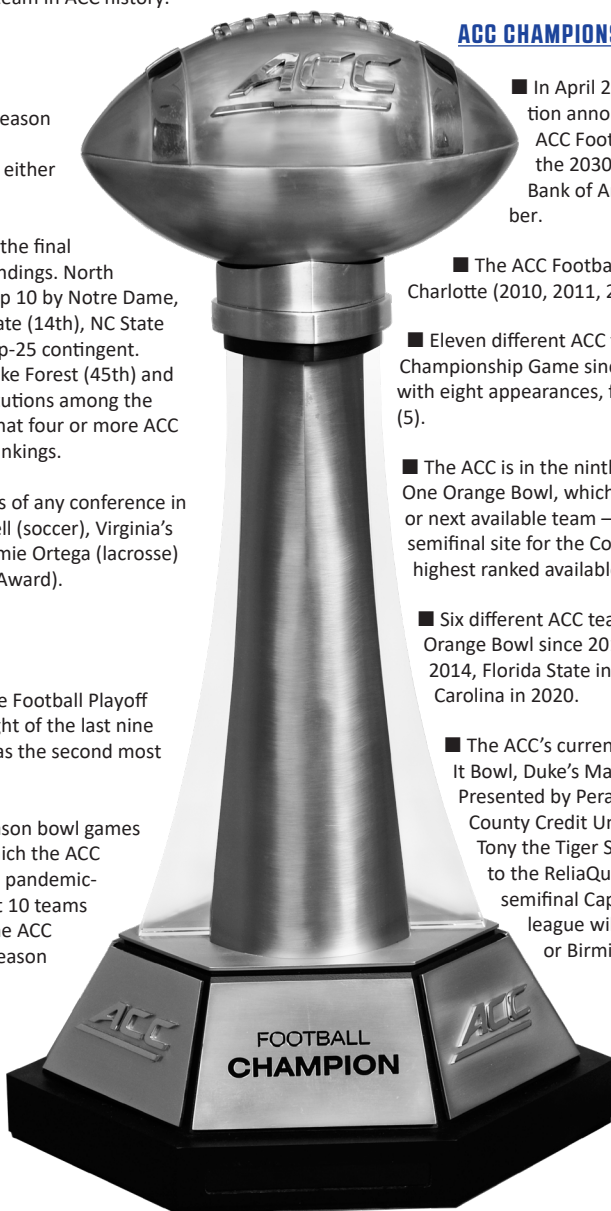
■ The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, 2020).

■ Eleven different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with eight appearances, followed by Virginia Tech (6) and Florida State (5).

■ The ACC is in the ninth year of a 12-year agreement with the Capital One Orange Bowl, which will host an ACC team – either its champion or next available team – in all years when the Orange Bowl is not a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff. The opponent will be the highest ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten or Notre Dame.

■ Six different ACC teams have played in the prestigious Capital One Orange Bowl since 2013 – Clemson in 2013 & 2015, Georgia Tech in 2014, Florida State in 2016, Miami in 2017, Virginia in 2019 and North Carolina in 2020.

■ The ACC's current bowl lineup through 2025 includes the Cheez-It Bowl, Duke's Mayo Bowl, Wasabi Fenway Bowl, Military Bowl Presented by Peraton, Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl, San Diego County Credit Union Holiday Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl and Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl. In addition, the ACC will send a team to the ReliaQuest Bowl if the league's opponent in a non-semifinal Capital One Orange Bowl is from the Big Ten. The league will also send a team to either the Gasparilla Bowl or Birmingham Bowl on an annual basis.



ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

■ Since the 2005 season, the ACC has had 634 players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 99 first-round picks, the second highest totals of any conference.

■ Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft in Las Vegas, headlined by No. 6 pick Ikem Ekwonu (OL) of NC State to the Carolina Panthers. He was joined in the first round by Boston College OL Zion Johnson (17th, Los Angeles Chargers), Pitt QB Kenny Pickett (20th, Pittsburgh Steelers) and Florida State DE Jermaine Johnson II (26th, New York Jets). Clemson cornerback Andrew Booth Jr. was taken in the second round and North Carolina offensive guard Joshua Ezeudu and Virginia tight end Jelani Woods were third round picks. Fourteen ACC players were taken in rounds four through seven.

■ Ekwonu is the first ACC offensive lineman taken in the top six picks since Virginia's D'Brickashaw Ferguson was taken fourth overall in 2006.

■ The ACC has had 353 players selected since 2013 - the second-highest total among all conferences - and has had 40 or more players picked in five of the last nine drafts. The ACC's 45 draftees in 2018 was its third-highest ever.

■ Current ACC teams have had a total of nine players chosen as the first overall selection in the NFL Draft. The most recent was Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, who was tabbed first in 2021 by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Miami (Vinny Testaverde, 1987, Tampa Bay; and Russell Maryland, 1991, Dallas) and Virginia Tech (Bruce Smith, 1985, Buffalo; and Michael Vick, 2001, Atlanta) each had two top selections while Clemson (Lawrence, 2021, Jaguars), Florida State (Jameis Winston, 2015, Tampa Bay), NC State (Mario Williams, 2006, Houston), Virginia (Bill Dudley, 1942, Pittsburgh) and Syracuse (Ernie Davis, 1962, Washington) each had one. Also, NC State's Roman Gabriel, the No. 2 overall selection in the 1962 draft, was chosen No. 1 in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

■ The ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (CORE - Champions of Racial Equity) continued its mission to promote and encourage inclusion, racial equity and social justice through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.

■ Among CORE's accomplishments in 2021-22 were the creation and recognition of the inaugural UNITE Award Class; the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "Awareness to Action"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Selma and Montgomery, Alabama in July, 2022.

■ The ACC conducted a Health and Safety Summit in Greensboro in May, in partnership with the ACC Sports Medicine Association, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, nutritionists, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.

■ The 2021 ACC/Big Ten Basketball Challenge used the series of 28 men's and women's games to bring awareness to the importance of mental health and to help to break down any stigma related to mental health struggles.

■ In December, the first cohort of "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy" was completed. The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.

■ The ACC's Professional Development Academy was completed in June and featured more than 60 student-athletes coming together as part of a four-week program. The Academy's curriculum, designed and delivered by student-athlete development administrators from ACC member institutions, assisted participants in identifying core values, developing circles of influence, establishing effective communication and leadership skills, and charting career plans.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

■ A player from a current ACC school has won the William V. Campbell Trophy® five times, including three times in the last eight years. That is the most of any conference over that span. The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.

■ Eight ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate (GSR) at or above the FBS average based on the report released by the NCAA in November 2022.

■ The ACC remains the only conference to have multiple football teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Boston College (97), Clemson (92), Duke (95), Louisville (94), Pitt (94) and Wake Forest (93) reached that plateau in this year's report.

■ For the 15th consecutive year, the ACC led the way among FBS conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report.

■ ACC teams continue to stand out among those from Division I colleges and universities that meet standards and excel academically, as evidenced by the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA in January 2022. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR. In football, 11 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average 969 (second among peer conferences).

ACC NETWORK

■ Owned and operated by ESPN in partnership with the Atlantic Coast Conference, ACC Network (ACCN) and its digital platform ACCNX is a 24/7 national network dedicated to ACC sports that launched on August 22, 2019. ACCN televises more than 500 regular-season and tournament games from across the conference's 27 sponsored sports plus a complement of news and information shows and original programming. Together, ACCN and its digital platform, ACCNX, combine to feature more than 1,500 ACC events each year. ESPN has been televising ACC content since 1979 and has exclusive rights to every conference-controlled game across all sports and championships.

■ Carriage agreements are in place with the following video providers: Comcast's Xfinity, Cox, DIRECTV, DIRECTV STREAM, DISH Network, Frontier, fuboTV, Google Fiber, Hulu+ Live TV, Mediacom, Optimum, Sling TV, Spectrum TV, Suddenlink, Verizon Fios, YouTube TV, members of the NCTC, NRTC and Vivicast, among others. All ACCN games will also be available on the ESPN App to authenticated subscribers. Fans interested in learning more about ACCN can visit <https://getaccn.com>.

■ The ACC Network made its second consecutive Road Trip in 2021, visiting each of the league's football programs on their respective campuses, which resulted in an hour-long primetime show that included interviews, behind the scenes footage, tour of the football facilities and much more.

■ During the 2022 season, ACCN's premier football program 'The Huddle' took to the road with appearances at Florida State, NC State, North Carolina, Syracuse, Virginia Tech, the Subway ACC Football Championship Game and the Capital One Orange Bowl Peach Bowl.
